Re: IECA Supports S. 1000, the “Energy Savings and Industrial Competitiveness Act of 2011”

Dear Senator Shaheen and Senator Portman:

On behalf of the Industrial Energy Consumers of America (IECA), we support passage of S. 1000, the “Energy Savings and Industrial Competitiveness Act of 2011,” with the inclusion of the provisions that call for various studies that advance industrial energy efficiency. This legislation will help identify federal and state policy barriers to increased industrial energy efficiency, including greater use of combined heat and power, and require the DOE to develop a strategy to double CHP capacity by 2020. These are all very positive initiatives.

There are two ways that manufacturing companies can improve their competitiveness and increase jobs. They can either increase revenues or decrease costs. Improving energy efficiency is an excellent way to reduce costs.

We have lost 5.5 million manufacturing jobs since 2000. Due to the loss of competitiveness and a slow recovery of jobs (about 500,000 since 2010), we have a long way to go. We believe that improving energy efficiency is a solid winning policy platform that will contribute to capital investment, reductions in emissions and an increase in jobs.

We thank you for your leadership on this important legislation.
